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### WRITTEN NOTIFICATION: CMOH and MOH

Non-compliance with: O. Reg. 246/22, s. 272

CMOH and MOH

s. 272. Every licensee of a long-term care home shall ensure that all applicable directives, orders, guidance, advice or recommendations issued by the Chief Medical Officer of Health or a medical officer of health appointed under the Health Protection and Promotion Act are followed in the home.

The licensee has failed to ensure that all Alcohol-Based Hand Rubs (ABHR) being used for hand hygiene, should ensure their ABHRs were not expired as recommended by the Chief Medical Officer of Health (CMOH).

Specifically, the Ministry of Health's Recommendations for Outbreak Prevention and Control in Institutions and Congregate Living Settings, 2024 directive, specifies that the ABHR must not be expired. On specified dates, several ABHR products for point of care needs for hand hygiene were noted to be expired.
