Inspection Summary/Résumé de l'inspection



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The purpose of this inspection was to conduct a Complaint inspection.

This inspection was conducted on the following date(s): May 17-21, 25-27, and June 4, 2021, as an off-site inspection.

The following intake was inspected upon during this inspection:

- One intake related to visitation restrictions.

During the course of the inspection, the inspector(s) spoke with the Administrator, Executive Vice President of Clinical Services and Chief Nursing Executive (CNE), Clinical Manager, Manager of Environmental Health for the Northwestern Health Unit and the Manager of Infectious Diseases for the Northwestern Health Unit.

The Inspector also conducted a review of relevant records and policies.

WN #1: The Licensee has failed to comply with LTCHA, 2007 S.O. 2007, c.8, s. 3. Residents' Bill of Rights

Specifically failed to comply with the following:

s. 3. (1) Every licensee of a long-term care home shall ensure that the following rights of residents are fully respected and promoted:

14. Every resident has the right to communicate in confidence, receive visitors of his or her choice and consult in private with any person without interference. 2007, c. 8, s. 3 (1).



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Findings/Faits saillants :

1. The licensee has failed to ensure that residents had the right to receive visitors of their choice without interference.

A complaint was submitted to the Ministry of Long-Term Care, regarding visitation restrictions. The complaint indicated that the home had required those traveling from outside the Fort Frances region to isolate for seven days prior to entering the home.

As per the Ministry of Long-Term Care's COVID-19 visiting policy, Long-Term Care Homes are responsible for supporting residents in receiving visitors, while mitigating the risk of exposure to COVID-19. The policy further indicates that if the local public heath unit was in the Orange (Restrict), Red (Control) or Grey (Lockdown) levels in the provincial COVID-19 Response Framework: Keeping Ontario Safe and Open, or if the home was in outbreak, only essential visitors were permitted to the home and a maximum of one caregiver per resident may visit at a time.

On January 14, 2021, a provincial emergency was declared, and a stay-at-home order was issued. The Assistant Deputy Minister addressed a memo to Long-Term Care Home Stakeholders that indicated that these enhanced measures did not impact the current requirements for essential visits to long-term care homes and that during the declared provincial emergency, all homes were required to follow the applicable requirements and restrictions based on the Grey (Lockdown) zone.

A document titled "Riverside COVID Response Update: Rainycrest Outbreak Declared Over and New Visitor Restrictions" dated March 1, 2021, indicated for long-term care, all visitors who had traveled outside of the Rainy River district, with the exception of Nester Falls or Onigaming in the past 7-days were required to isolate for seven days prior to visiting, with proof of a negative COVID-19 test.

In an interview with the Administrator, they indicated that the requirement for seven day isolation was put in place by the corporate office, but that the restrictions were coinciding with public health restrictions, which encouraged individuals not to travel outside their district. In an interview with the Executive Vice President, Clinical Service and CNE, they indicated that the decision to implement a seven-day isolation requirement was based off public health's guidance to restrict non-essential travel. The Executive Vice President, Clinical Service and CNE indicated there were exceptions for essential caregivers, which were considered on a case by case basis.



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In an interview with the Manager of Infectious Disease for the Northwestern Health Unit, they indicated that the requirement to have visitors isolating for seven days prior to entering the long-term care home when traveling from different district, was not consistent with the recommendations from the public health unit. The Manager of Infectious Disease indicated that the public health unit did not have any requirements for isolation when traveling within the region, which included the Rainy River district and Kenora. The Manager of Infectious Disease indicated that they encourage homes to follow the current screening requirements and directives.

VPC - pursuant to the Long-Term Care Homes Act, 2007, S.O. 2007, c.8, s.152(2) the licensee is hereby requested to prepare a written plan of correction for achieving compliance ensuring that the following resident right is fully respected and promoted: Every resident has the right to communicate in confidence, receive visitors of his or her choice and consult in private with any person without interference, to be implemented voluntarily.
